Introduction to the Liturgy of the Day

Today's opening antiphon invites us to clap our hands and shout with joy, for our God is a God of life. God brought life into the world at creation, making us in the divine image. Jesus brought new life to the world, redeeming us and preparing us for eternal life with the Lord. We come together here today, as we do each Sunday, to hear the word of God, to be nourished in the Eucharist, and to give praise and glory to God. May our lives, energized by the Holy Spirit, witness to the wonderful generosity of our God, our God of life.

Introduction to the Liturgy of the Word

Today's readings assert God's power over death. The author of Wisdom states that God created all things that they might have life. Paul teaches the Corinthians that just as Jesus graciously sacrificed his divinity, and in fact his life, so that we may share in his richness, in eternal life, we are called to sacrifice our abundance. Jesus brought life to two people, healing a woman with a lengthy illness and raising a girl from the dead. Listening to today's readings, let us imagine how we can give life to those living in the shadow of death.

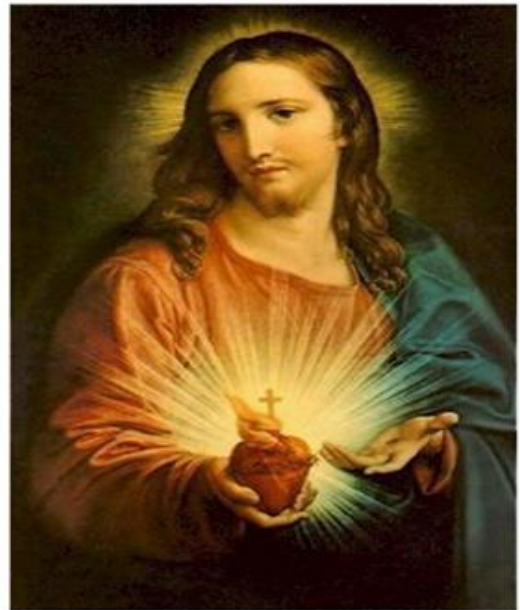
Preparation of the Gifts

The altar is prepared, the gifts are received. Several brief rites follow with accompanying prayers, some prayed silently by the priest and deacon and others said aloud. We call this part of the Mass the "preparation." What kind of preparation is happening? First, the presider holds up the paten or bowl containing the hosts and says words that Jesus must have said many times, since they derive from ancient Jewish meal prayers: "Blessed are you, Lord God of all creation!" We have brought forward our gifts, our offering to God, and now we acknowledge that they are not really ours—the gifts that we give are God's gift to us. It is "through your goodness" that we have gifts to offer. It is significant that we offer not wheat and grapes, but bread and wine; "fruit of the earth and work of human hands." Bread and wine are both God's work, and ours. These preparatory rites also prepare us for what we are about to do in the Eucharist, a mystery in which divine and human meet; a holy collaboration in which our action is caught up into God's divine plan.

*“Why this commotion and weeping?
The child is not dead but asleep.” —Mark 5:39*



The Jewish Law contained many purity laws which were vital to maintain public health. When Jesus chose to touch the corpse of Jairus' daughter, even when he touches *us* with his healing hand, Jesus not only shares the pollution of sickness and death, his love and compassion transforms that pollution and corruption (*the disease of sin*), into life. Why would Jesus knowingly break such a law? What does this say about him?

Rather than Jesus being polluted and considered unclean as the law makes clear, his healing power gives salvation and purifies the pollution of sin that affects our minds and hearts. And so, rather than him breaking a rule, what we see in this story is an example of Jesus not being *subject* to the Law but coming to *fulfill it*.
